# Leadership View: Growing Old in Silver Spring



Retiring last April prompted me to reflect on growing older and old in Silver Spring. When my wife Janet and I started living in the neighborhood more than three decades ago, as Boomers in our mid-30s, we gave no thought about "aging in place." But now that we're eligible for Medicare and not planning to move anywhere anytime soon, we are extremely grateful to the founders who officially launched Silver Spring Village in 2013 after nearly 3 years of planning. I joined the Village and started as a volunteer

in 2014 and became a member of the board of directors in 2015. Starting this month, I am honored to serve as the Village board president.

What are the opportunities as well as challenges of growing old in Silver Spring? Many of us are improvising as we live longer lives in a changing society and shifting economy. ### How to . . .

...become a member: Residents of zip code 20910 are eligible for full or associate membership. Persons living close to, but outside 20910, are considered for full membership on a case-by-case basis. Associate membership is open to all applicants regardless of place of residence. All members can attend events, get discounts from local businesses, receive a subscription to Washington Consumers' Checkbook, access our information service, and get referrals to professionals. Full members can also receive services from our volunteers such as transportation, indoor and outdoor household help, technology support, friendly visits, and check-ins. Membership dues cover only part of our operating expenses and are: Full: \$350/individual or \$450/couple; Associate: \$150/individual or \$250/couple. ...volunteer: People age 18 or older who support our "age in place" mission are invited to serve as volunteers. Volunteers are not required to be members of the Village (though they are welcome to join, and many do). They need to complete an interest form and application, and have a background check. Training is provided. All applicants must be officially accepted and enrolled by the Volunteer Coordinator before performing tasks for the Village. All sorts of skills and interests are welcome.

### Volunteer Corner: Congratulations, Village Volunteers!

The National Volunteer Transportation Center has recognized the great work of our Village with a "Fast Start" 2016 STAR Award! This national award is a significant accomplishment.

As part of the application for this award, a member who receives rides from many of our drivers wrote the following:

I'm an independent sort. Own a car, but drive only a couple thousand miles a year. Determined to age in place.

In February I needed surgery, and spent 4 weeks in the hospital, and 2 weeks of rehab .... Just to get home with the ability of getting myself in/out of bed (that was independent!). Couldn't drive; couldn't walk further than a block; couldn't use subway/metro. How do I survive?

Enter Silver Spring Village ... among their services—rides with safe, friendly and on-time volunteer drivers. Since I received my first diagnosis, volunteers have provided over 18 rides to doctor's appointments and 5 rides to social events. Am I happy, oh yes. Am I independent, yes—not quite in the way I used to define it, but still aging-in-place. Thank you, Village!

The Fast Start Award comes with a cash donation to our Village plus free participation for all our volunteer drivers in the online AARP Smart Driver Safety course.
